

How to prepare for a breast ultrasound

What is a breast ultrasound?

An ultrasound reveals images of organs and soft tissues inside your body. It uses sound waves to make images. It is not an x-ray.

A breast ultrasound helps the radiologist learn more about lump that may be found in the breast tissue. A breast ultrasound can show the radiologist if the lump is a fluid-filled cyst or a solid mass.

How to prepare for a breast ultrasound?

Bring your health card to your appointment.

What to expect?

A Registered Ultrasound Technologist will perform the ultrasound. The technologist will show the images to a breast radiologist who may request more images or perform another ultrasound.

When you arrive at your breast ultrasound appointment:

- 1. You will change into a hospital gown.
- 2. You will lie face up, and the technologist may ask you to reposition to one side.
- 3. Ultrasound gel will be put on your skin, which may feel a little cold.
- 4. The technologist will move a smooth tool, called an ultrasound probe or transducer, across your skin. This probe will send sound waves through the breast tissue creating pictures on a computer screen.
- 5. The examination may take 20 minutes to 1 hour.
- 6. In some cases, a breast biopsy is recommended. A biopsy may be done the same day as a breast ultrasound, or might be scheduled on another day.
- 7. The results of your ultrasound will be sent to the doctor who ordered the test.

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
